From the East

"A certain point within a circle..." The symbology of Freemasonry goes back centuries. Operative Masons left their marks on their work. sometimes as a proud gesture that 'Masons were here', and sometime because their pay depended upon it. The so-called 'Maker's Mark' goes to this use. Count the bricks with your mark, and that's how much you would be paid. In our speculative Lodges, symbols are used to introduce and re-enforce moral concepts within our rituals. We, and much of the public, recognize the Square and Compasses as associated with Freemasonry among other craft ideas. In ritual, we discuss the use of the rule, level, plumb, and other symbols and over the vears, have even attached them to our speech.

"Are you 'on the level'?" and "Be square with me" are colloquialisms we use in our day-to-day conversation. Symbols are important in our daily lives. And so, when we first are introduced to the point within a circle, we may see that this is a pure play on how to act as an individual Brother. It ties together the ideas of religion, morality, and our humanity onto one succinct lesson as to how they are all inter-related. I'm neither a biblical scholar, or an esotericist. The following thoughts are based on my own personal experiences and certainly my

scant knowledge of ancient personalities. The ideology of St. John the Baptist is based on his thoughts around penance. A more contemporary view might be that the man who recognizes his errors or deviations from morality must listen to his inner compass and attempt to make amends. This Saint was all about watching his morals, and affecting penance. St. John the Evangelist (also known as the Apostle) impresses one with his service to duty and his dedication to his sense of morality. He demonstrated his morality by being an example and impressing on others the importance of being a good person. Both of these men are found in the Bible, with several books written about them, and therefore the Holy Scriptures at the vertex of the circle. To the point, inside the circle, all three sources of inspiration are visible. Is it possible to err? Of course. But by St. John the Baptist, we are obliged to make amends. Should we remain silent about what we believe to be moral? Of course, not – we teach our children and others through our actions and discourse. We are obligated to be truthful and to correct bad or immoral behavior when we see it. Are we left to wander about the world seeking guidance and morality? No, the Holy Scriptures are there as a reference.

This is my interpretation of the point within the circle. How does this symbol relate to you and your daily life? Do you apply it in your own life in ways you might not have recognized?
